

The regular confession of our venial sins helps us form our conscience, fight against evil tendencies, let ourselves be healed by Christ, and progress in the life of the Spirit. CCC, 1458

In the simple prayer Good Morning God, we say "forgive the many errors that I made yesterday." If we truly want forgiveness then we need to go to confession. Confession, as we commonly call it, is a Sacrament. The Sacrament of Penance, as Venerable Pius XII explained it: "Venial sins may be explated in many ways...But to ensure more rapid progress...in the path of virtue, we will that the pious practice of frequent confession... should be earnestly advocated. Venerable Pius XII taught that confession in general increases self-knowledge, helps us grow in humility, corrects our bad habits, makes us more spiritually diligent and less lukewarm, purifies our conscience, strengthens our self-control, and lastly gives us graces. Benedict XVI said Confession "offers us the possibility to begin our life again, and this new beginning is realized in the joy of the Risen One and in the communion for forgiveness that it gives us."

We need to understand confession's enormous positive value. The first step is to pray that the Holy Spirit opens our hearts to know and be honest about the sins we need to confess. The second step is to make a thorough examination of conscience. Begin with the Ten Commandments and measure our lives against them. We need to look deeply at the intent of each commandment. We haven't killed anyone perhaps, but have we "killed" someone's reputation, or "killed" someone's spirit by bullying; did I "kill" someone in my anger-wishing them dead; could I have "killed" someone by my reckless driving; Could I have "Killed" someone's virtue by the way I dressed, or by my jokes, or by passing on harmful reading material? All these questions and more can be interpreted as intent to kill, though we murdered no one. We should look at each of the commandments in this careful way.

After realizing what we have done, or failed to do, we need true contrition. We must be "really sorry." If we have sinned and aren't truly contrite why confess at all: it's not like we can fool God. If we worry that our sin is so terrible we can't be forgiven, forget your pride, you won't be asking forgiveness for a sin Father hasn't heard many times. Father will simply be happy that you have come to confess in the first place.

If we are serious about a relationship with Jesus, let us call the Holy Spirit to guide us to examine ourselves, grant us humility, and allow Father to grant us absolution in the name of Christ.
